



# Auckland Orienteering Club President's Report 2019

After the effort of hosting or co-hosting two major carnivals in the immediately prior two years (Oceania/WMOOC 2017; Nationals 2018), 2019 was a relatively quiet one on the event-front for the club. I say relatively because we still enjoyed our usual smorgasbord of 50+ club events around the region, and hosted the Auckland Regional Champs at Labour weekend and co-hosted the NZ Secondary School Champs in August (in conjunction with NWOC). Read on for a summary of our 2019 year.

## EVENTS

AOC organised 38 events in 2019: 3 Auckland Champs, 1 NZSSOC Sprint, 3 AOS events, 19 SummerNav, 4 Winter Sprints, and 8 Night Street events. Plus the region's other clubs NWOC and CMOC hosted a range of AOS, rogaine, championship and club events as well, offering orienteers in the Auckland region over 50 events to enjoy over the year.

The overall participation numbers are an estimate based on results from all our events. However it will include some people who run more than one course at some events (great enthusiasm!), and exclude those who do not register a result at all (more common at our clipcard events, SummerNav and Night Street events). On average in 2019 we welcomed 138 people to each of our 38 events.

SummerNav continues to thrive, and attracts not only club members but a large number of non-club members who like the challenge of an evening summer run around a park with a map in hand. It is a great promotion for orienteering, and many of our members had their first taste of orienteering at a summer series event over the years. Thanks to all the planners and controllers, set-up crew, control collectors and results volunteers who have put up their hands to help this season, and to the tireless team who work behind the scenes to manage the overall delivery of SummerNav every year. Special thanks to Selwyn who took on the role of gaining permissions for all the venues this year.

We held 3 AOS events last year, on the remapped Turkey Ridge, Temu Rd (lower), and Hedley Dunes North maps. Numbers attending these events ranged from ~170 (AOS1) to over 300 (AOS7), making these quite large events to manage. Apart from the usual roles of planner, controller, coordinator, registration, start and finish personnel, with lots of new and inexperienced people coming along we also need to have plenty of experienced club members around to help them understand the map and get started. Large areas of our older maps have been felled in the last year

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Part of the challenge during the year was adapting from our past SportIdent management system (using Sport Software OE2010 for management, and O-Lynx for results screens) to using O-Lynx only for the whole event for AOS7. This was necessitated by a change in the O-Lynx software making it less compatible with OE2010 for live results. We have all got used to having live results with intermediate splits at our large forest events, so we are keen to try to maintain this. With some pre-event testing and practice, we managed to use O-Lynx without too many issues for AOS7, and we will continue to develop our knowledge and understanding of the software and assess its functionality into the future. We also need to increase our pool of technically confident people to run the software setup and event management programmes, to reduce the load on individuals at events. This will be a focus for 2020.

In August we helped co-host the NZ Secondary School Champs with NWOC. The overall event was managed by NWOC member Annemarie Hogenbirk, with NWOC delivering the Relay and Long, and AOC the Sprint. Members of both clubs signed up to help on the day for this large event, which had ~450 students signed up. The event also saw a film crew recording live coverage, organised by ONZ. Although it was necessary to delay online playback of the filming to preserve course integrity, it was great to see orienteering showcased in a way we hadn't seen before. Labour Weekend saw the club organise the Auckland Champs 2019. This kicked off with a Middle on the updated Muriwai Regional Park North map, a mix of mature coastal pine forest and intricate open dunes. The Long on Sunday was on a new map of an area last used many years ago, Mushroom Rd East, which is a challenging physical section of pine forest, with more hill climb than most Woodhill maps that tested people's endurance fully. Labour Day Monday saw a chance to finally use the Wynyard Quarter/Viaduct map for a competitive event; this area was initially mapped for WMOC 2017 but had to be abandoned due to traffic control concerns for the large numbers attending that event. On a quiet public holiday this was less of a problem, and it was great to see orienteers sprinting around the streets of downtown Auckland as a change from our usual campus sprint maps.

## RESULTS

The results from the major events around the country in 2019 are attached. Also 2019 was an Oceania year, so major placings at the individual events from that carnival are included as well.

Oceania was held in Australia in conjunction with their Australian Long Champs and the Schools Championships midweek. There were over 1000 entries for the Oceania individual events, making for large fields in many grades and exciting racing. Congratulations to Juliet Frater and Luke Clements who became W16 and M16 Oceania Sprint Champions respectively. Special mention to Simonius Jager for winning the M21A Middle and Long titles – time to return to the E grades Simon!

We had some good results again at the NZ National Champs in Oamaru (PAPO hosted). Numbers of both AOC participants and placegetters was understandably down on 2018 due to location in the South Island on very unfamiliar terrain. Also a large contingent of junior club members and families were off in Europe preparing for the World Schools Orienteering Champs in Estonia. PAPO put on a great carnival with some interesting new maps and challenging course setting. Congratulations to all the winners and placegetters across the 4 days.

No AOC club members were selected for JWOC in 2019, but the club had both Tommy Hayes and Toby Scott representing NZ at WOC. Tommy was also selected for the NZ WMTBOC team.

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The club was also proud to see 14 of our Junior members head off to the World Schools Orienteering Champs in Estonia in 2019. They were part of the school teams selected to represent New Zealand based on results from NZSSOC in 2018. The 4 school teams were Junior Boys (M2) – Mount Albert Grammar School (MAGS); Junior Girls (W2) – St Cuthbert's College; Senior Boys (M1) – MAGS, Senior Girls (W1) – Diocesan.

The AOC team members selected to go by their schools were:

The team performed admirably, with some great results both individually and for the teams. In the W2 grade Zara Stewart was 1<sup>st</sup> in both the Long and Middle races, and outstanding achievement. Other strong performances came from from Luke Clements (5<sup>th</sup>, M2 Middle) and Sofia Toes (7<sup>th</sup> W2 Middle), and the overall team results for NZ were excellent: W2 1<sup>st</sup> St Cuthbert's College, M2 3<sup>rd</sup> MAGS, M1 9<sup>th</sup> MAGS, and W1 5<sup>th</sup> (Diocesan).

The final interclub event for the year was the Auckland Relays, hosted by NWOC. We won back the Shield! Well done all, particularly our junior grades which dominated their classes.

### ONZ AWARDS

At the ONZ AGM at Easter 2019, Leon McGivern was recognised for his contribution to orienteering, and schools orienteering in particular, over many decades with the Silva Services to Orienteering award.

For many young Aucklanders their first experience at orienteering comes through a coaching session run by Leon McGivern. The success of these sessions can be measured by the numbers – last year alone Leon's programme delivered 424 training sessions to 13 Auckland Primary Schools, reaching over 2,300 students.

Leon began orienteering in Putaruru in the 1970s and has been a member of the Auckland Club (or its predecessor the Central Orienteering Club) for close to 40 years. He has played an active part in making equipment for the Club (when people actually made things) and has held every single office except Treasurer. It is his passion for teaching however that excites Leon the most and where he has made such a strong contribution towards the growth of our sport. We must also mention Leon's wife Barbara, who supports Leon with the not insignificant task of administering such a large undertaking.

So congratulations and thank you, Leon and Barbara.

### MAPPING

2019 saw several new and updated maps made, with some new club members making their first maps as well: Kieran Woods produced a new SummerNav map - Mangere Central Park; and Martin Crosby developed his forest mapping skills by producing the new Mushroom Rd map with Selwyn. Selwyn and many others also updated various other maps throughout the year as we put on events,

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thanks to everyone who helped with this. Maps are an important asset for the club, and we are keen to encourage anyone with an interest in mapping and developing their skills further to let us know, we would like to support this.

In 2019 we also signed a mapping MOU with NWOC regarding developing and maintaining the Woodhill forest maps we use; many of these are now shared between the clubs, so we have made a formal arrangement to share mapping costs between the two clubs for these, and future maps in Woodhill forest too, although both clubs retain the right to withdraw from projects they don't support.

### MEMBERSHIP

The club membership remains steady at around the 400 mark; of this number over 250 members join as part of a family group. The number of Juniors remains high, and is one of the strengths of the club.

### FINANCIALS

The club is in a sound financial position. Income is down on the previous year as we didn't hold a large carnival event, but likewise our expenses as a club were also lower. Auckland Champs at Labour weekend had relatively small participation numbers, but did break even.

The pro-rata payout from the ATEED grants made to ONZ from the profits of the World Masters Games was distributed to the three clubs last year for mapping projects, as this was deemed a suitable use of funds to develop orienteering in the Auckland region.

The grants we received in 2018 towards purchase of SI cards and compasses left us in a stronger financial position in 2019 than we would otherwise have been, and allowed us to use some of our club funds to purchase a defibrillator which will improve our first aid options in remote locations.

In 2020 we will look at finalising a plan to replace our old campermatic; we haven't rushed this decision as we want to get it right, and there are lots of options available, although most have drawbacks we need to consider before proceeding. We will aim to apply for grants towards this.

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### TRUST FUNDS

#### Gergo Memorial Fund

2019 saw the establishment of the Gergo's Fund for the club, in memory of our late club member and friend Gergo Verhas, who died from a fall while climbing Mt Rolleston in the South Island in 2016. For this we are indebted to Gergo's partner Kat, who is the idea behind the fund and will generously donate to the fund initially to assist club members between the ages of 18 and 31 inclusive to travel overseas and compete internationally

Gergo was a great adventurer and traveller, his love of the outdoors taking him to many parts of the world. In the same spirit of a young person adventuring to pursue their dreams, Gergo's Fund will be used to assist club members between the ages of 18 and 31 inclusive to travel overseas and compete internationally. In recent years club members have received grants from the Junior Training Fund or Nicholls Memorial Fund to attend overseas championships, but with the depth of talent we have in the junior ranks this has put these Trust Funds under pressure, especially the Junior Training Fund. Having Gergo's Fund to support those selected to represent us overseas or wishing to compete overseas to further their development will allow the Junior Training Fund to do more at the grass roots level and ensure we continue to have a pipeline of emerging talent coming through.

In addition Kat plans to gift the grant beneficiary with a special Auckland Orienteering Club training shirt with Gergo's initials on it, so Gergo's sense of adventure will travel with the club member and help inspire them to give their best. We think that sounds quite special. So on behalf of the Club thank you Kat for what is a wonderful initiative, a fitting tribute to Gergo, and a real benefit to support our club members.

Statements for the Club's three trust funds are attached to the Clubs financials. Below is a brief summary of the funds and who they are targeted at.

- the Nicolls Fund: established to assist senior members of the Club who compete in international competition within New Zealand or overseas, and
- the Junior Training Fund: created to assist juniors and students under the age of 21 with training expenses and for fees/expenses for regional, national and international events.
- the Gergo Fund: established in 2019 in memory of our late club member Gergo Verhas, to support 18-31 year old club members develop their orienteering skills overseas.

The trusts are funded by contributions from the Club's operating surplus plus donations from members. They are governed by trustees who are appointed to consider applications and award grants. Grants are at the discretion of the trustees. However, applications must be received in writing (or email) from the club member to be considered. So if you would like to be considered for funding towards a trip or project, make sure you apply to the trustees (you can send to the club President in the first instance, to be forwarded to the trustees).

In 2019 the Nicholls Fund was able to assist Tommy Hayes with his travel costs to represent NZ at WOC and WMTBOC.
